Needham School Committee Minutes of the Meeting October 2, 2018

Superintendent's Comments

Superintendent's Comments

Superintendent Gutekanst invited the School Committee and the Needham community to a screening of "METCO: Yesterday, Today, Tomorrow" a story of Needham's METCO program. He stated that the program will take place on Wednesday, October 17, 2018, in the Newman Elementary School auditorium, at 7 pm. Superintendent Gutekanst expressed his appreciation for Natalie Guthrie, Needham High School Media teacher, and the Needham Channel for their supportive work in putting together this documentary.

Superintendent Gutekanst stated that on Tuesday, October 9, 2018, he will attend the Select Board meeting for their Public Hearing on School Use Regulations. He explained that work has been done over the last year to revise the Rules and Regulations for Use of School Facilities and associated fee schedule, which includes a proposed fee increase. He added that the Public Hearing will provide an opportunity for comment before the Select Board vote.

Superintendent Gutekanst stated that at the request of the Chairman of the School Committee, he has asked Terry Duggan, Assistant Superintendent for Student Learning to report on MCAS information and test scores for Needham.

Dr. Duggan stated that the Next-Generation 2018 MCAS Test results for Needham students in grades 3-8 for English Language Arts and Math are available. Dr. Duggan reported that the state has implemented a new accountability system that incorporates additional indicators to measure how well schools are performing in the area of the progress for ELL student proficiency in learning English, the advanced coursework completion at the high school

level, chronic absenteeism and the performance of the lowest 25% of the students. Dr. Duggan stated that she is pleased with the results that were published this week. She added that Needham was 1 of 68 school districts across the commonwealth who have met their targets. She explained that in order to meet targets, school districts must obtain 75% towards improvement, Needham is at 86%. Dr. Duggan stated that principals are reviewing the scores with their staff, and individual MCAS reports will be mailed on October 15. She also stated that a new redesigned report card for each school will be coming soon. Dr. Duggan stated that more information will follow in January.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Needham High School Student Advisory to School Committee Report

Needham High School SASC Report

Dr. Gutekanst introduced this item. He stated that this is the first of several reports the SASC will provide the School Committee this year. Dr. Gutekanst stated that the SASC meets regularly with the principal to discuss school issues, concerns, and ideas with the high school administration. He also stated that the students are excited and prepared to discuss these issues with the School Committee and welcome questions and comments. Dr. Gutekanst welcomed Junior, Noah Basson, Senior Ava Feuer, Freshman, Robin Kane, Junior, Sara Kates, Sophomore, Aidan Michelow, and Junior, Zach Sickles and invited them to present their report.

Ava thanked the School Committee on behalf of the Student Council for the opportunity to present their report. Ava noted that there is no freshman update because they just voted in their Freshman Class Officers.

Students gave an update on fundraising activities that are planned for this school year. The sophomore class reported on events that will not only include the student body but the greater Needham community as well. The junior class reported on their proposed fundraisers that will raise money to support their annual Junior Harbor Cruise. The senior class reported on its traditional fundraising activities.

Students also presented at-large activities: Homecoming, and the annual Bonfire that will be held the Monday before the Thanksgiving break and will be opened to the greater Needham community.

Students reported on a new communications initiative that is intended to improve student to administration communication. Student Council will update an old website and create an all-school NHS Facebook page. Students Council will also initiate regular segments on the student news regarding the current affairs of the school community.

Students provided an update on construction and parking, pointing out that construction has been loud but not inconvenient. The ongoing construction has created a mad rush for parking in the upper lot, however, there has not been any accidents and academic classes have continued per usual despite the ongoing construction Students reported that not having access to the A gym has been an

ongoing concern, and that Wellness classes are held outdoors or held in any available classroom space.

A lengthy and comprehensive discussion followed.

Early Childcare Proposal

Early Childcare Proposal

Dr. Gutekanst introduced this item. He stated that the School Committee may wish to consider offering a pilot early childcare program for staff that is completely funded by fees. He added that the district is winding down its KASE program (Kindergarten After School Enrichment) in anticipation of full day kindergarten next year, and the early childcare program could be modeled after the KASE program.

Dr. Gutekanst welcomed Diane Simmons, Director of Planning, Communication, and Community Education, and invited her to share highlights of the proposal.

Ms. Simmons stated that Needham Community Education will provide a fee-based, developmentally appropriate enrichment program for infants (3 months to 15 months) and toddlers (15 months to 3 years) from 7:00 am to 4:00 pm every school day throughout the school year. Ms. Simmons stated that the program is targeted for the staff of Needham Public Schools. She also stated that she believes staff will consider this program as a benefit for working for Needham Public Schools.

Ms. Simmons outlined the need for the program and described other early childcare programs in comparable school districts. Ms. Simmons presented data on private daycare programs serving the Needham community. Ms. Simmons summarized what the program would look like in FY2020. She described space considerations: short-term and long-term. Ms. Simmons described program options: 2-day to 5-day options for P-T and F-T staff, and the possibility of developing a lab program for the high school. Ms. Simmons outlined next steps. Discussion followed.

Anne Gulati outlined fixed cost. She added that there is a need to provide a contingency fund balance so that to cover salaries. Ms. Gulati stated that 89% of costs are salary cost which includes direct service and overhead. She added that 6% of the cost are non-staff fixed, such as rent etc. and 5% are for snacks etc.

Human Resources 2018-2019 Staffing Report

Human Resources 2018-2019 Staffing Report

Dr. Gutekanst introduced this item and welcomed Dr. Alex McNeil and invited her to present information about the district's efforts to hire qualified teaching staff. He stated that the district will continue to consider additional steps, procedures, and programs to hire and supervise a highly qualified, talented, and diverse staff.

Dr. McNeil stated that the year has launch very successfully with all professional positions filled. She noted that a few teaching assistant positions have not been filled. Dr. McNeil took a moment to express her appreciation to the hiring managers and their teams.

Dr. McNeil reported that 51 new people applied on average to open positions every week and that vacancies were filled within 30 days. She stated that New Teacher Orientation took place August 20 & 21, with 66 participants. She also stated that Professional Teacher Status took place on September 27, 2018, with 34 teachers achieving Professional Teacher Status and 6 Administrators were recognized for three years of service. Dr. McNeil stated that this summer the district held its first Teaching Assistant Fair. She added that there were 22 attendees and 5 persons were hired into positions.

Dr. McNeil presented staff facts for FY2017/2018. She stated that overall the 2017/2018 hiring season filled 40 professional positions & 36 support positions. She stated that a total of 408.2teacher FTEs, and 47 administrators FTEs were hired. Dr. McNeil noted that 99.4% of teachers are highly qualified, and 95.2% of teachers are proficient. Dr. McNeil stated that teacher retention rate is 89.7%, and principal retention rate is 87.5%.

Dr. McNeil stated that because of the work of the Race, Equity, Access, and Leadership (REAL) Coalition she decided to look at the district's distribution of staff by race, new staff by race, and new hires by race since July 2018. She presented data and stated that the data comes from the report the school department sends to the state through EPIMS (Education Personnel Information Management Systems).

Dr. McNeil stated that generally the number of persons entering education has declined and it has become a challenge to diversify staff. She added that 80% of teachers nationally are white. She stated that there are fewer persons of color entering the teacher pipeline, which presents a challenge to increase the diversity in Needham. Dr. McNeil outlined next steps. Discussion followed.

FY2020-2024 Draft Capital Improvement Plan Request

FY2020-2024 Draft Capital Improvement Plan Request

Dr. Gutekanst introduced this item. He stated that as part of the budget development process, the school administration has discussed and identified capital items for submission. He also stated that the capital list has been developed in collaboration with school and Town staff. Dr. Gutekanst stated that the School Committee will be asked to vote on the CIP at a subsequent meeting.

Before the CIP Request presentation, Dr. Gutekanst took a moment to update the School Committee on the October 1 Preliminary Enrollment Report. He noted that as of October 1 the report shows that there are 5730 students in the district.

Anne Gulati, Assistant Superintendent for Finance and Operations presented the proposed Capital Improvement Plan Requests for FY2020-2024. Ms. Gulati stated that the FY20 request is \$1,365,787 and includes technology/equipment and facilities. The FY20-24 request is \$168,784,952 and is a larger request that reflects the general priorities established in prior capital submissions and school planning documents.

Ms. Gulati continued with an overview of the technology replacement, vehicle replacement, copier replacement, furniture replacement, and document management system. She stated that the annual funding requests have changed, in some cases to reflect an updated lifecycle analysis for copiers, updated vehicle replacement prices, updated furniture replacement priorities, an updated schedule for the document management project, and updated technology replacement needs. Ms. Gulati noted that door key card access controllers have been added as a new component of the school technology request.

Ms. Gulati reported that the School Master Plan study is a new request. She added that this request would assess school capital needs and develop updated recommendations for long-range capital plans under different enrollment trajectories and the practical considerations of aging buildings. Ms. Gulati stated that this work is intended to inform future CIP plans and complement Needham 2025 and master planning efforts.

Ms. Gulati reported on the revised request to install a preschool playground shade shelter and to return this request to CIP for funding. Ms. Gulati referred to the 2018 Full-Day Kindergarten

Feasibility Study and anticipated enrollment growth at the Broadmeadow and Eliot Schools, and reported on projects to convert the technology lab at each school into classrooms and an additional project to install up to six modular classrooms at the Eliot School. Ms. Gulati reported on a revised request to reconfigure and increase the number of physical education lockers in boys and girls locker rooms to accommodate enrollment growth.

 ${\tt Ms.}$ Gulati reported on a new request to conduct a needs assessment/feasibility study of upgrading the theatrical sound and lighting systems in the Pollard, Newman and Needham High School (NHS) auditoriums.

Ms. Gulati stated that a placeholder project to modernize the existing Hillside School as swing space for school and Town projects is being proposed. Ms. Gulati updated the School Committee on Mitchell School renovation/replacement and Emery Grover Administration Building renovation. Discussion followed.

Special Town Meeting Preparation

Special Town Meeting Preparation

Dr. Gutekanst led the discussion on this item. He stated that School Committee members have a copy of the Special Town Meeting Warrant as well as a copy of Frequently Asked Questions for Article 11 and 12. Members of the School Committee reported briefly on what was discussed during the Warrant meetings.

Chairman Pressman stated that there has been a lot of discussion about the upcoming override, which is substantial for the public safety buildings. He also stated that he and the Superintendent of Schools are reflected of the fact that the schools are highly dependent on public safety functions that are routinely being used to help students and staff in the school department. Chairman Pressman added that although the override is limited to public safety, it is one that affects the schools and that the schools would benefit from the new buildings.

Dr. Gutekanst stated that he has invited Town Manager, Kate Fitzpatrick, Needham Police Chief, John Schlittler, and Needham Fire Chief, Dennis Condon to outline the partnership that exists with the school and public safety. He stated that they will talk briefly about the project, how it benefits not only the community but in a huge way the schools.

Normative Component: Accountability Percentile

- Accountability percentile, measures the performance of all students in a school compared to other schools in the state
 - Reported as a percentile, from 1 to 99
 - Calculated using all available accountability indicators for a school
 - Compares schools administering similar statewide assessments
 - non-high schools, serving a combination of grades 3 through 8
 - middle-high and K-12 schools, serving one or more grades 3 through 8 and grade 10
 - *high schools*, where the only tested grade is grade 10

Criterion-Referenced Component

- Measures a district's or school's <u>progress towards improvement targets</u>.
- Focus on closing the achievement gap by raising the "achievement floor"
 - Gap closing can occur as a result of a decline in the performance by the high performing group
- In addition to meeting targets for the school as a whole, the <u>performance</u> of the lowest performing students in each school will be measured
 - Every school has a group of lowest performers
 - Identified from cohort of students who were enrolled in the school for more than one year
 - Cohort model
 - Year-to-year approach

Criterion-Referenced Component: Targets

- In 2018, targets set only for one year, using 2017 data as baseline.
 - Long-term targets will be set in the future, once there are multiple years of Next-Generation MCAS data to analyze
- Targets for achievement indicators based on assessment performance of schools that have demonstrated improvement in the past
- Targets for achievement on the legacy MCAS tests and for the non-assessment indicators set by analyzing past trends using data that DESE has been collecting and reporting for several years along with reasonable expectations for improvement.

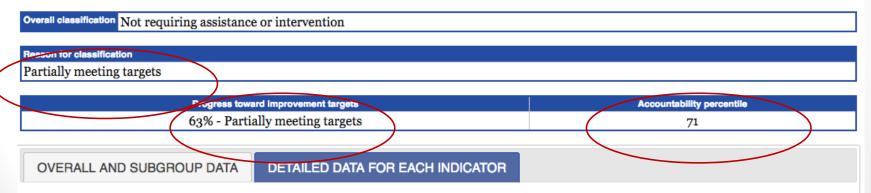

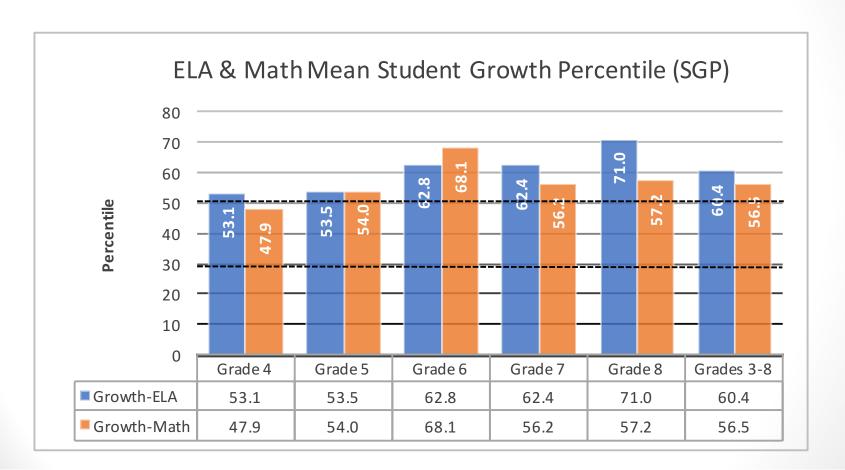

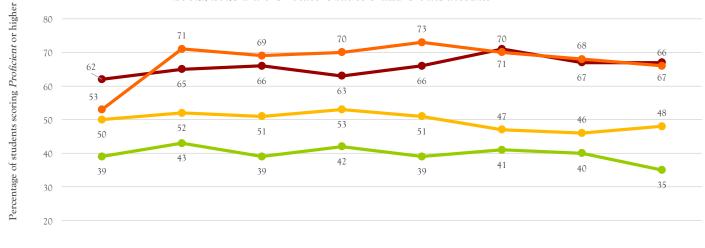

Science: NPS & State Grades 5 &8 (%A/P)

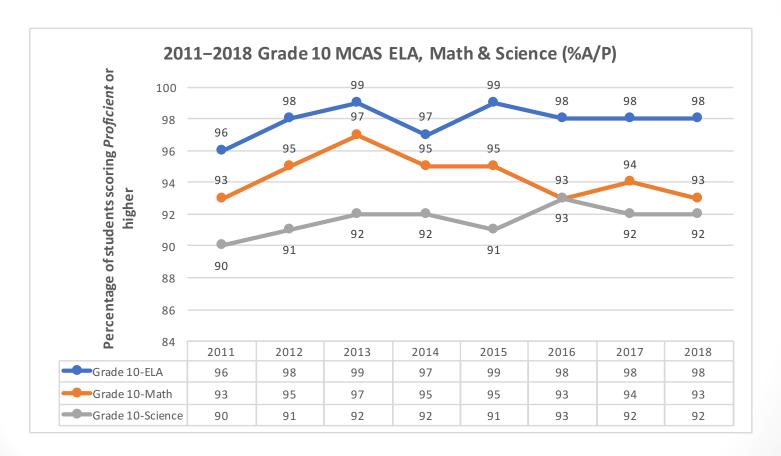

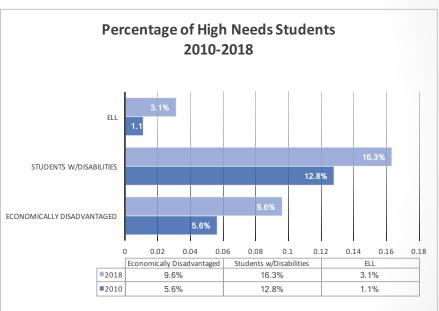
Demographics: Our Community 2010-2018



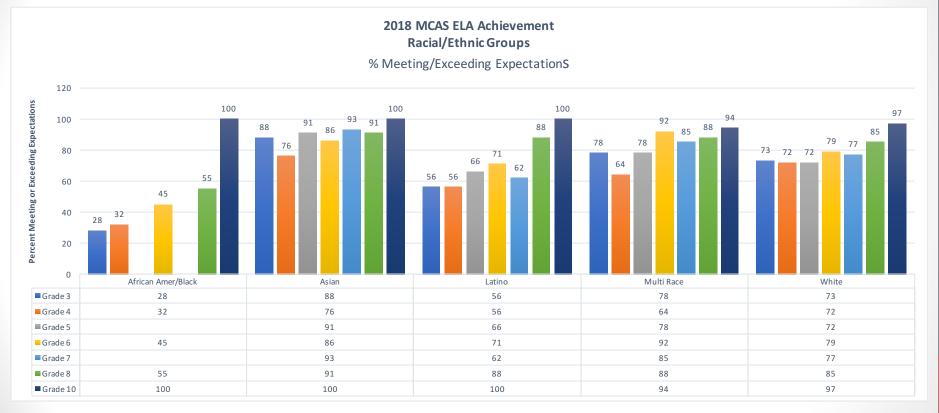

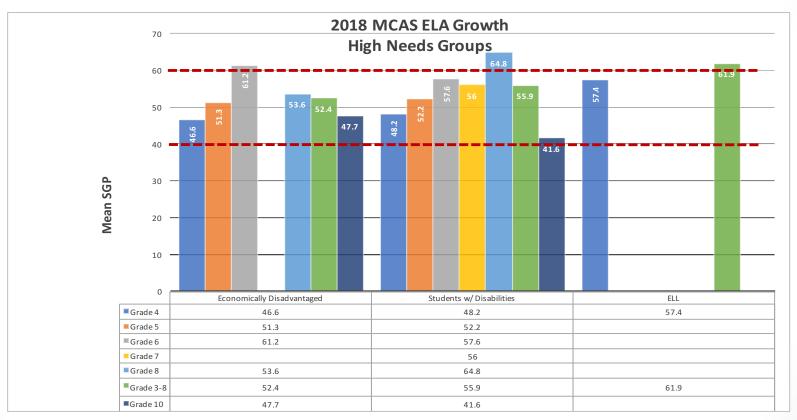
Achievement: ELA High Needs Groups



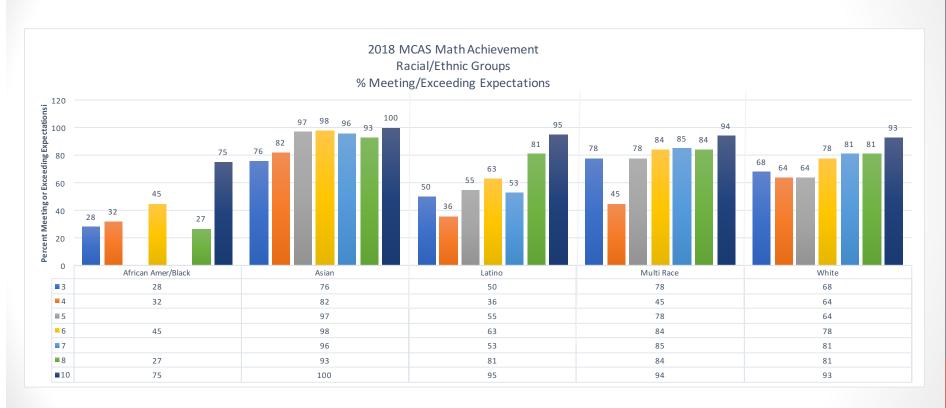

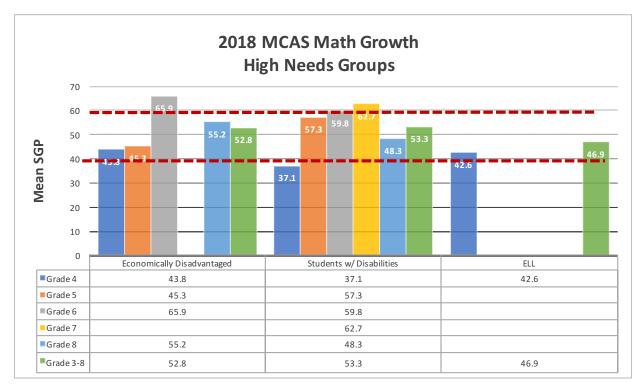
Achievement: Math High Needs Groups

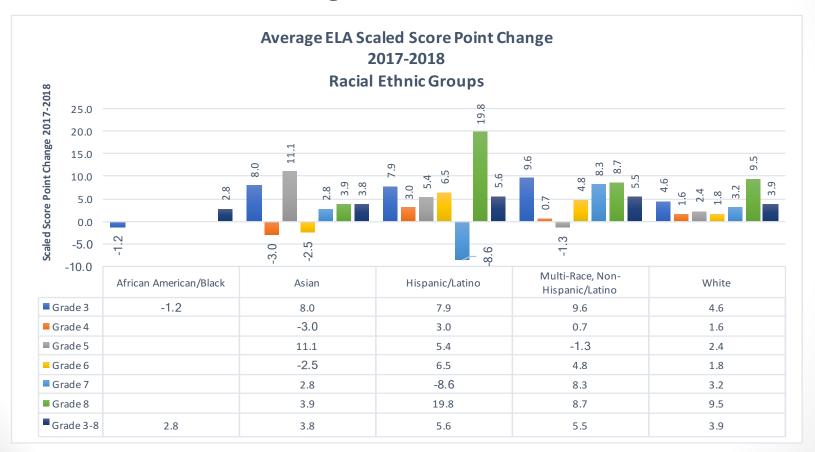

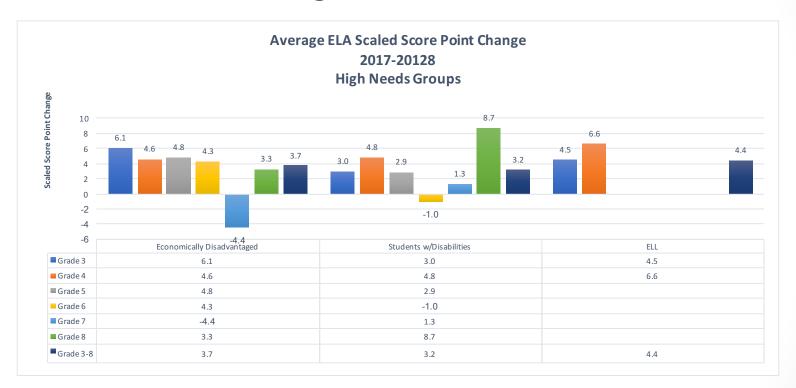

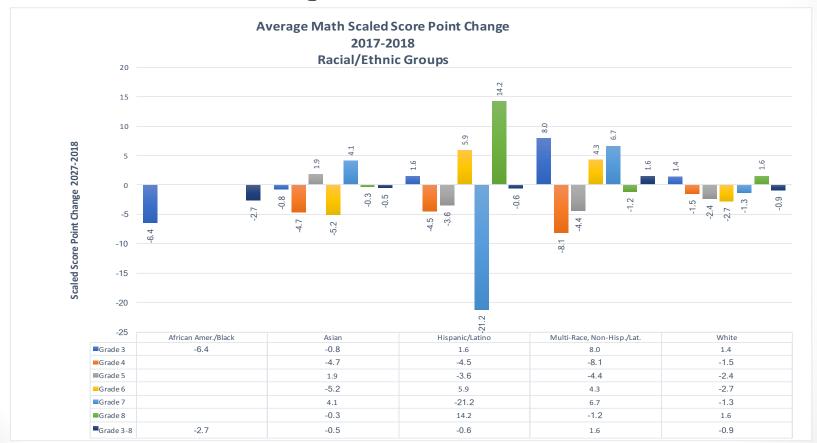
Achievement: Change in ELA Scaled Scores 2017-2018



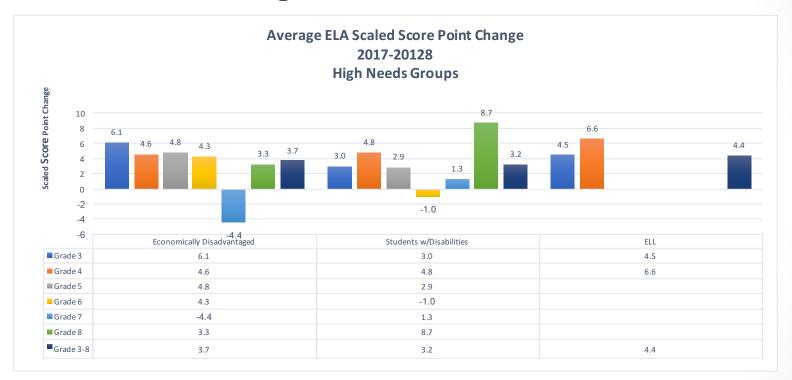
Achievement: Change in ELA Scaled Scores 2017-2018



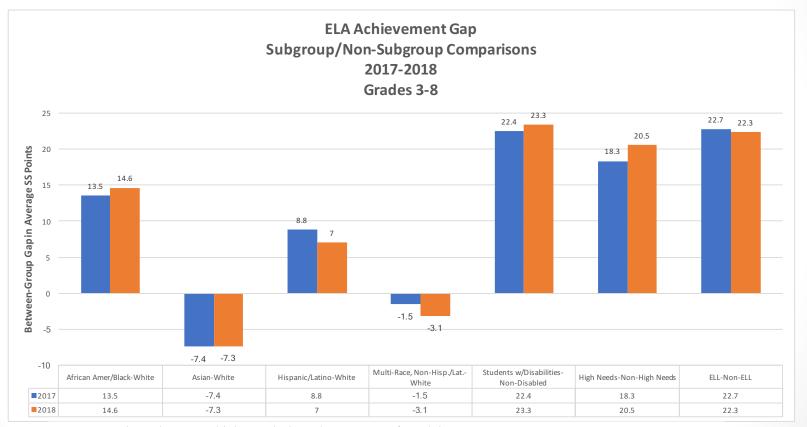
Achievement: Change in Math Scaled Scores 2017-2018



Achievement: Change in Math Scaled Scores 2017-2018

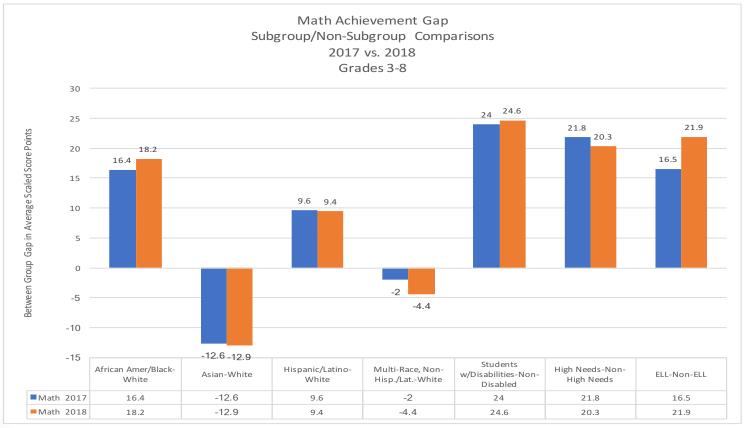

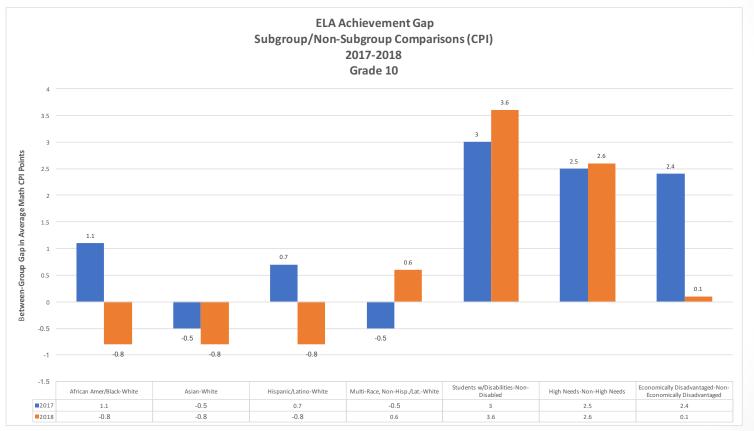

Achievement Gap Change: Math



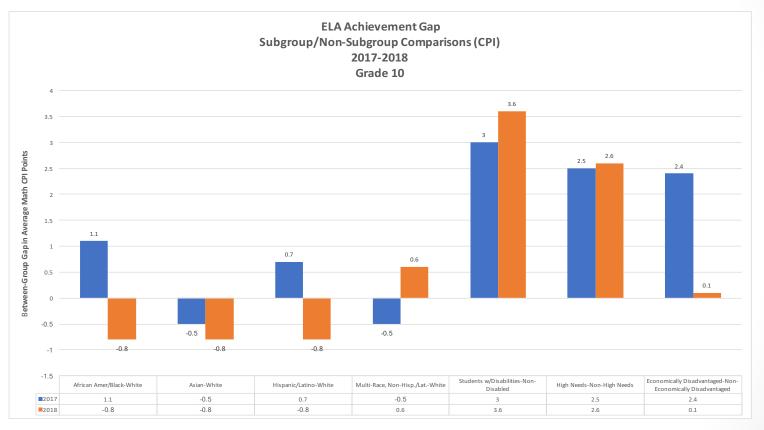

Achievement: Change in Math (CPI) 2017-2018

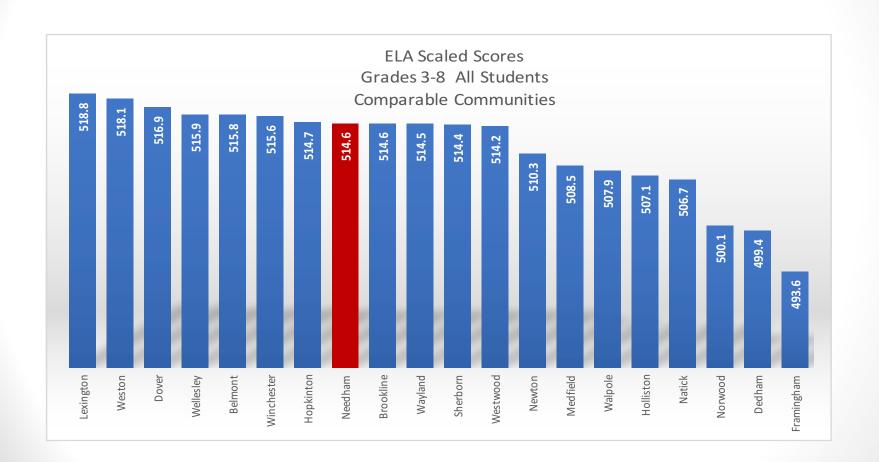

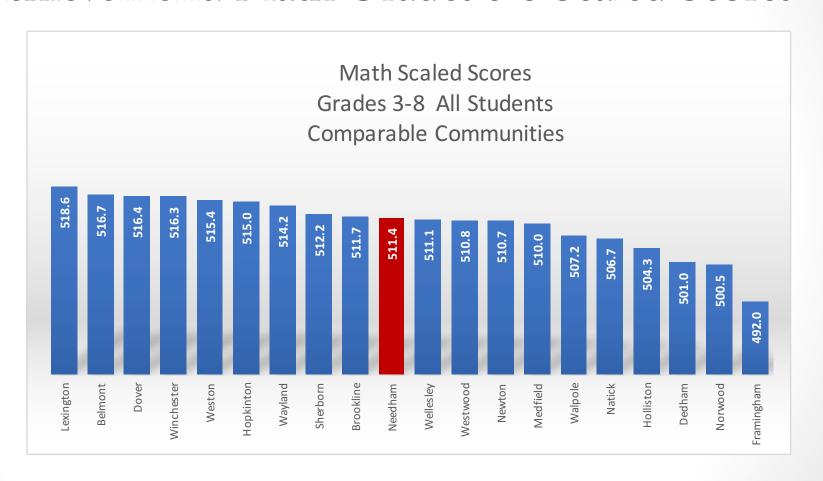

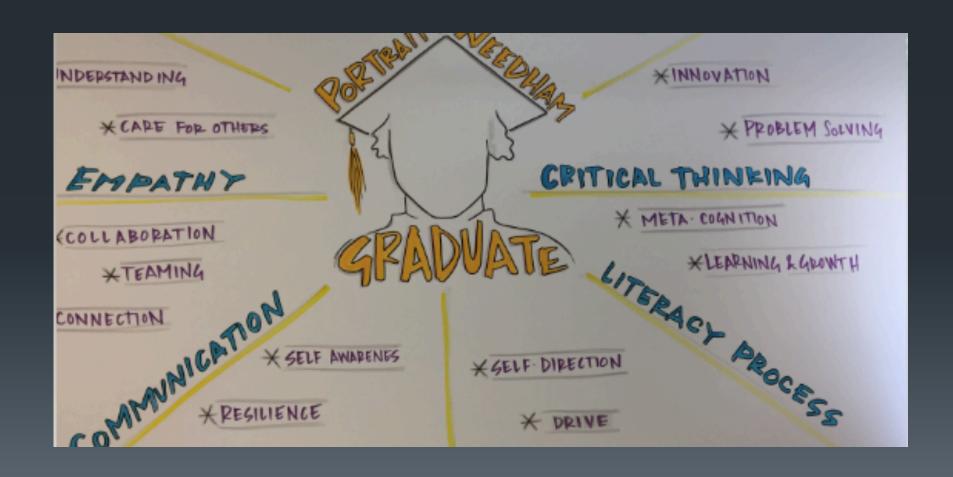

Boys Ice Hockey JV2 User Fee Proposal:

Over the past few years we have seen a jump in the number of students trying out for Boys Ice Hockey.

- 61 athletes in 2017-18
- 60 athletes in 2016-17
- 58 athletes in 2015-16

In a meeting with members of the youth hockey program in Needham, they indicated those numbers will be consistent and probably rise in the next few years.

We currently have a Varsity and Junior Varsity Team with ideal rosters sizes of 18-22 players. The last few years in an effort to not make too many cuts, we have carried more players on the JV team. We were able got creative in ways to make sure everyone was able to play, however the situation was far from ideal and created many logistical problems. The feedback we have received from families of children who were either cut or on the bubble, is that they just want an opportunity for their children to continue playing the sport they love.

The challenge for us has always been a lack of available "ice time" to accommodate more players. Working with our coaches, we found an alternative option that other schools in our Conference like, Wellesley and Natick, have done to be able to offer a 3rd team. There is a league in Foxboro that offers JV Games on Sunday's. Our proposed JV2 team would play in this league, which offers them 10 games and a scrimmage. We would also be able to provide them approximately 1 practice per week during the winter season. This would afford us the opportunity to not have to cut any athletes and provide an opportunity for these students to keep playing hockey.

The cost of the Foxboro league is \$3500 and 10 practices at an average cost of \$300 per sheet would have total expenses of around \$6500. To be able to cover these costs, we would like to be able to charge a reduced user fee of \$400 per student, from the \$585 that the Varsity and JV programs pay. With a projected 16-20 athletes these expenses will be covered. I would reallocate the Winter Event Program Manager Stipend that is typically earmarked for Ice Hockey games, to cover the coach's stipend. I would like to ask for approval to add a user fee of \$400 for this 2018-2019 Winter Season. It would reflect the Club Sport user fee of \$225 plus a \$175 surcharge.
